Membership Fees

At our 2021 AGM, the Board and attending members voted to increase our Membership Fees to be in accordance with other Specialty and Interest groups in the CNA Canadian Network of Nursing Specialties.

Please note that our membership fees increased on April 1, 2022. This is the first time we have raised our fees since 2010! For those who currently hold 3-year memberships, this increase will not apply until your renewal is due.

Fossil Fuel Ads Make Us Sick Campaign

Fossil Fuel Ads Make Us Sick is a public health campaign led by the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (CAPE) and a broad coalition of health, cultural, parent, and environmental groups, including CANE! Air pollution caused by the burning of fossil fuels causes between 15,000 and 34,000 premature deaths in Canada each year and 1 in 5 deaths globally. Yet, just like the tobacco industry, fossil fuel companies are lying to us about the known dangers of their products. We're demanding that the Government of Canada enact a ban on all fossil fuel advertisements.

As a voice for nurses, we have a responsibility to speak up when we think people's health is in danger. Air pollution from fossil fuels causes between 15,000 and 34,000 premature deaths in Canada each year. "Fossil fuels affect those who are least able to protect themselves or have a choice in protecting themselves, including those living in poverty and racialized populations who are most likely to live in areas of increased air pollution related to fossil fuels,"

Climate Conscious Inhaler Prescribing Collaborative

This fall, CASCADES will be running the Climate Conscious Inhaler Prescribing Collaborative – a learning opportunity based on an established spread model for Quality Improvement innovation. An application for MainPro+ credits (3 credits/hour) is in progress. Through three learning sessions (between September 2022 and March 2023) and regular check-ins, participating teams from primary care settings across Canada will receive access to and training on a number of tools that can be used to facilitate deprescribing, switching, teaching technique, and proper disposal. Teams will learn from providers who have successfully implemented these tools, receive support from CASCADES as they test and adapt the tools, and generate collective knowledge on how best to further refine and spread the tools. The Collaborative is open to teams who are new to climate conscious inhaler prescribing as well as groups who are already working on improving inhaler sustainability.

Teams will IDFALLY:

 Be multidisciplinary (possible team members include, but are not limited to: prescribers, respiratory therapists, nurses, pharmacists, IT staff, managers OI staff, patient-partners)



- Have embedded QI and measurement capacity
- Have organizational support (if applicable)

*Individuals able to implement and track changes on their own are also welcome



Applications will be considered on a rolling basis; the final deadline to apply is August 19, 2022.

Shifting Power:

Zero-Emissions Electricity Across Canada by 2035

Reliable, affordable, 100 per cent emissions-free electricity in Canada by 2035 is entirely possible. Not only that, it would create numerous jobs and help Canada meet its international climate obligations.

"Shifting Power: Zero-Emissions Electricity Across Canada by 2035" is the first Canadian modelling study to explore pathways to zero-emissions electricity by 2035 without relying on expensive and sometimes unproven and dangerous technologies like nuclear or fossil gas with carbon capture and storage. The analysis uses purpose-built electricity modelling to explore reliable, affordable pathways that prioritize wind, solar, energy storage, energy efficiency and interprovincial transmission, while also accounting for a growing economy and aggressive electrification up to 2050.



CANE acknowledges and celebrates National Indigenous History Month and National Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21st. CANE's Board and committee members continue to reflect on our role in a health system that, historically and ongoingly, has fostered institutionalized racism towards Indigenous peoples.

Relationship with the land is central to health and healing in Indigenous communities. The impact of generations of colonization has dispossessed and disconnected Indigenous Peoples from their traditional territories and lands. In response to persistent colonial policies and social systems, Indigenous Peoples are resurging and sustaining Indigenous lifeways through their movements toward land-based education and healing. Read on to learn more about land-based education as Indigenous-led health care and healing practice.

Indigenous Land-based Learning

Indigenous land-based cultural practices are multi-faceted and pull together layered concepts and teachings. There are hundreds of diverse Indigenous nations across Canada, and Indigenous land-based teachings are just as varied and place-based. We encourage you to read "Land as teacher: Understanding Indigenous land-based education", a rich account of land-based education in the context of ongoing colonialism, dispossession, reconciliation and decolonization across the country. "Learning from the land: Indigenous land-based pedagogy and decolonization" delves into further detail and analysis of land-based learning and decolonization. See this pamphlet inspired by the work of the Misipawistik Pimatisiméskanaw land-based learning program (Misipawistik Cree Nation, Manitoba) to learn how Indigenous land-based education benefits public policy such as sustainable development, the TRC Calls to Action, and climate action.
